President's Report 2014

The last 12 months has been a busy time for all involved in infection prevention and control. As a profession, we have been faced with the realities of healthcare reform, reduction in resources, and the challenges of infectious diseases in the returned traveller as we watch the number of measles notifications increase Nationally, and of course, the College has been actively involved in the National response to the West African Ebola crisis.

All of these challenges bring opportunities for our profession to highlight and showcase what we do best – preventing and controlling infection. The National healthcare associated infection agenda has seen input from College members into position statements, National Standards and guidelines with the outcomes being the launch of the Commission Standards, ACHS's clinical indicators for infection control, and of course, the increased focus on antimicrobial stewardship.

Over this time, the College has facilitated approximately 65 events and has had over 1400 member registrations for these events. It is wonderful to see that ACIPC members are actively engaged with many participating in various sessions. These activities assist with networking, as well as professional development and we are receiving very positive feedback from everyone who attends. Next year's membership activities will continue to include journal club, breakfast networking meetings, new member webinars, lunch-and-learn sessions, as well as the 3M *Marketing for Success* and State/regional one day education workshops.

We also engaged with our corporate partners, holding our first face-to-face meeting with key stakeholders. This event provided an opportunity for our corporate partners to openly discuss how we can work collaboratively together to further opportunities for education, research and product development. This event provided a platform for future collaborative actions, not to mention an understanding of pressures and expectations of ICPs and corporate partners.

Member engagement and provision of opportunities for education and networking have been our objectives during this phase as we continue to consolidate the work of the College. This could not happen without the interest and enthusiasm of all members who drive these activities – too numerous to mention, but make no mistake – your efforts are appreciated – you are building the College now and for the future.

The College journal, a tangible product for member's research, remains an important focus of the College. *Infexion Connexion* continues to gain momentum with questions posed on a daily basis from all around the world. Social media is also starting to become an important tool for sharing information such as radio interviews, conference sessions. Tweet @ACIPC @HealthcareInfec.

On a special note, I would also like to acknowledge the nomination of Claire Boardman for Australian of the Year (previous AICA President September 2007 – November 2011, ACIPC President 1 January 2012 – 30 June 2012 and ACIPC Past President until 30 June 2013). Claire's hard work in bringing the previous State and National bodies together, being a role model and furthering the professionalism of the ICP has propelled not only her professional standing within Australia, but also highlighted awareness of our organisation. A great achievement acknowledged.

I do wish to acknowledge our support staff, Lorelei and David Broadbent, Paul Hodgson and Steve Burke for their hard work and dedication to enable all of the events, resources and support for our members. To our Immediate Past President, Marija Juraja; President Elect, Ramon Shaban; and the Executive Council members: Phil Russo, Annie Wells, Lesley Lewis, Cheryl Rosiak, Tain Gardiner, Michael Wishart, Donna Cameron and Mary Potter thank you for your commitment and hard work in driving our Vision to lead education, research and evidence base practice building a healthier community.

Committee Reports

<u>Credentialling and Professional Standards Committee</u>

The Credentialling and Professional Standards Committee (CAPS) further enhanced the work and professional standing of the College and its members during 2014.

The committee has commenced revision of the former AICA Practice Standards by which infection control professionals practice, and are scheduled for launch in February 2015.

The credentialling and re-credentialling of members continues with growing interest from individuals across Australasia.

The CAPS committee was recently approached by the Australian Stomal Therapy Nurses Association to conduct an external review of their credentialling program based on the standing of the ACIPC program. This follows ACIPC's leadership of the introduction of the Drug and Alcohol Nurses Association credentailling process during 2013. CAPS Committee Chair, Professor Ramon Shaban, led the establishment of the DANA credentialling program, which is based on the ACIPC model. ACIPC is pleased to be in a position to assist fellow professional Colleges with establishing and reviewing credentialling programs and commend these and other efforts to extend their professional standing.

The committee provides and facilitates a mentorship program for individuals seeking initial credentialling and also those undertaking re-credentialling as they extend their professional standing. The committee has commenced the formal evaluation of ACIPC's credentialling with particular emphasis on making greater use of the expertise of its credentialling members through an ACIPC Expert Database.

The committee is working on establishing a position statement articulating the Elements of an Infection Control Program with the aim of launching it in 2015.

Finally, the work of the committee has been further extended to include College representation and participation in global outbreak preparedness and response in partnership with other leading organisations, in particular the World Health Organisation Global Outbreak Alert and Response Network.

Special Interest Group Advisory Committee

The Special Interest Group (SIG) Advisory Committee was an inaugural College committee responsible for establishing SIGs and for setting-up a framework for them to operate.

A set of geographic and topic-based SIGs have been established. A suite of activities is occurring from face-to-face networking and professional development meetings, seminars, webinars and teleconferences. An email discussion list for communication between members of each SIG, plus an area on the College website where resources can be posted is available. The opportunity exists for the establishment of new SIG groups and interest from members is regularly called for through the College E-bulletin.

In May 2014, the SIG Advisory Committee was disbanded as the purpose of this group - to establish SIGs and develop a framework for them to operate - had been achieved. Ongoing stewardship of Special Interest Group activity has now been incorporated into the functions of the Education Committee.

Education Committee

The Education Committee has provided input and guidance into the educational activities of the College during 2014. There have been many activities facilitated by the College throughout the county and in a variety of formats such as workshops, webinars, seminars and professional development forums. Examples of workshops include: Antimicrobial Stewardship, Aseptic Technique and 3M Marketing for Success. The College has provided funding for interstate guest speakers at some State based SIG professional development forums. Topics have included: accreditation and catheter associated urinary tract infections. The College partnered with a State based SIG to run a one-day seminar.

Webinars have also been regularly facilitated by the College this year and examples include; Ebola Virus Disease, Writing for Publication, Novice ICP Network series, Journal Club and New Member webinars.

A significant piece of work that has been completed by the Education Committee is the development of a detailed Education Strategy that sets out priority areas for 2014 - 2016. The priority areas include the development of:

- short courses, forums and online resources;
- · basic infection control courses; and
- an accreditation framework for infection prevention and control courses in Australia.

To support the priorities set out in the Education Strategy, the College has allocated resources to employ an Education Officer. The Education Committee was instrumental in developing the position description for this role of which recruitment is currently occurring. The Education Officer, once appointed, will be responsible for working on the priority areas as set out in the Education Strategy. The Education Committee and Executive Council will provide input and support the Education Officer. In 2015, current and new educational opportunities for College members will continue.

Governance Committee

The Governance Committee was established in 2013 with the aim of providing a robust governance structure that will guide the functions and services of the College to deliver maximum value to the membership.

This year, the Governance Committee recruited two members to the small team and commenced regular meetings with the following outcomes:

- Establishment of a Risk Register
- Establishment of a Contracts Register
- Drafting a number of governance polices which are progressing through the approval process in preparation to be published on the website
- Participating in the review of the College Constitution
- Working on draft Terms of Reference in preparation to establish a Finance & Audit Sub-committee. It is anticipated this committee will provide scrutiny and oversight of the College's financial management and investment strategies.

Member Services Committee

The Member Services Committee is now at full-strength and is very appreciative of the experienced members giving their time. Discussions have been held in regard to categories of membership, including Students and Fellows. Work is proceeding on a Member Charter, and strategies for engaging members. The Member Services Committee does not stand in isolation from other committees and there is some overlap - an example is the website, and the Communications Committee. A consumer page, with many useful links, has been prepared and added to the website.

Policy Committee

The Policy Committee has been re-formulated this year with its priority areas as listed in the Committee Action plan (published on the College website), ie, MRO Management (patient management to include readmissions, screening, clearance, management in specific areas ie RACF, risk assessment). – phase 1; Standard and Surgical Aseptic Technique (AT) – phase 2; and Environmental Cleaning – phase 3. In addition to this, the College has been active in contributing to policy development.

Research Committee

This year, the ACIPC Research Committee's main priority was to finalise the Terms of Reference (ToR) and establish robust governance of the ACIPC Grants process. Finalisation of the ToRs was achieved early, followed by endorsement from the Executive of the ACIPC Grant Rules and Application process.

During 2014, the inaugural ACIPC Grants were advertised and through a rigorous process of application review, including the involvement of two external reviewers, saw the successful awarding of the Early Career Research Grant and Seed Grant to two ACIPC members. These Grants will enable members to identify areas for research that will lead to improved knowledge; evidence based education and practice and improved outcomes, a key focus of the College.

The Research Committee members look forward to continuing to foster research opportunities with the members in the coming year.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2014

This financial report covers Australasian College for Infection Prevention and Control Ltd as an individual entity.

1. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Preparation

The financial report is a general purpose financial report that has been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards (including Australian Accounting Interpretations) of the Australian Accounting Standards Board and the Corporations Act 2001.

Australian Accounting Standards set out accounting policies that the AASB has concluded would result in a financial report containing relevant and reliable information about transactions, events and conditions. Compliance with Australian Accounting Standards ensures that the financial statements and notes also comply with International Financial Reporting Standards. Material accounting policies adopted in the preparation of this financial report are presented below and have been consistently applied unless otherwise stated.

The financial report has been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historical costs, modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities.

(a) Income Tax

The entity is exempt from income tax under Section 50 of Income Tax Assessment Act 1997. Accordingly no income tax is provided for in the acounts.

(b) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Tax Office. In these circumstances the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense. Receivables and payables in the balance sheet are shown inclusive of GST.

Cash flows are presented in the cash flow statement on a gross basis, except for the GST component of investing and financing activities, which are disclosed as operating cash flows.

At each reporting date, the company assesses whether there is objective evidence that a financial instrument has been impaired. In the case of available-for-sale financial instruments, a prolonged decline in the value of the instrument is considered to determine whether an impairment has arisen. Impairment losses are recognised in the income statement.
