Handwashing videos on TikTok during the COVID-19 pandemic: Potential for disease prevention and health promotion

Abstract

Background

Handwashing has long been promoted to maintain health and in preventing disease transmission. One of the most valuable ways to convey messages related to handwashing is through visual display, such as video for educational purposes and to enhance learning. Social media is an important and popular way to disseminate messages to a wide audience.

Methods

In this cross-sectional, descriptive study, two hashtags, #WashYourHands and #SafeguardSplash were used to select the sample of 100 from available TikTok videos. In order to code each video, the same coding categories were used for both hashtags, including (1) wetting and rinsing hands (2) lathering soap (3) time used for scrubbing (4) drying hands (5) mentions COVID-19 (6) mentions using hand sanitizer instead of soap (7) mentions how germs spread (8) mentions key times to wash hands (9) and actual depiction of washing hands. Additional descriptive categories were coded as well. The observations recorded were tabulated and descriptive statistics were performed. Independent one-tailed t-tests ($\alpha = .05$) were calculated to determine if a video's hashtag had a significant association with its garnered views, likes, and/or comments.

Results

In total, the 100-video sample received 1,990,834,567 views, 40,355,468 likes, and 173,422 comments. Despite the fact that each hashtag made up an equal proportion (50%) of the total sample, videos with #WashYourHands accounted for 93.3% of the total views. Coverage of the important steps involved in handwashing, such as drying hands, was minimal as was relevant background information.

Conclusion

The results indicate that while this opportunity is being realized to some degree, the majority of videos did not cover topics related important concepts of hand hygiene. Given the high engagement of younger audiences with TikTok, this could be a powerful mechanism for demonstrating and encouraging proper handwashing, especially in a population with low rates of handwashing.

Staff to staff transmission as a driver of healthcare worker infections with COVID-19

Abstract

Background

High rates of healthcare worker (HCW) infections due to COVID-19 have been attributed to several factors, including inadequate personal protective equipment (PPE), exposure to a high density of patients with COVID-19, and poor building ventilation. We investigated an increase in the number of staff COVID-19 infections at our hospital to determine the factors contributing to infection and to implement the interventions required to prevent subsequent infections.

Methods

We conducted a single-centre retrospective cohort study of staff working at a tertiary referral hospital who tested positive for SARS-CoV-2 between 25 January 2020 and 25 November 2020. The primary outcome was the source of COVID-19 infection.

Results

Of 45 staff who returned a positive test result for SARS-CoV-2, 19 were determined to be acquired at our hospital. Fifteen (15/19; 79% [95% CI: 54–94%]) of these were identified through contact tracing and testing following exposures to other infected staff and were presumed to be staff-to-staff transmission, including an outbreak in 10 healthcare workers (HCWs) linked to a single ward that cared for COVID-19 patients. The staff tearoom was identified as the likely location for transmission, with subsequent reduction in HCW infections and resolution of the outbreak following implementation of enhanced control measures in tearoom facilities. No HCW contacts (0/204; 0% [95% CI: 0–2%]) developed COVID-19 infection following exposure to unrecognised patients with COVID-19.

Conclusion

Unrecognised infections among staff may be a significant driver of HCW infections in healthcare settings. Control measures should be implemented to prevent acquisition from other staff as well as patient-staff transmission.

Online Short Course in IPC in Aged Care Settings

ACIPC is undertaking a revision of its Online Short Course in Infection Prevention and Control in Aged Care Settings.

The short course will increase the IPC knowledge and skills of RNs and EN/EENs working in Aged Care settings leading to:

- increased quality and safety in care delivery
- improved supervision and education of care workers
- implementation of AMS and other IPC strategies
- support for the IPC Clinical Leads and Facility/Clinical managers

The course will comprise various modules of approximately 18 to 20 hours of self-directed learning that will be supported by online resources, videos, structured readings, quizzes, moderated forum discussion, and a question-and-answer forum. This is the recommended course for Registered and Enrolled nurses working within the aged care sector.

The course can be undertaken over six to eight weeks and a certificate of completion will be issued to students who complete the course. There will be no exam.

‘Aged Care Nurses’ Payment to Reward Clinical Skills and Leadership

There has been 3000+ Aged Care IPC Leads graduate from the Foundations of Infection Prevention and Control course to date. The Department of Health have announced a \$135.6 million commitment to rewarding registered nurses who take on additional training responsibilities. This payment is aimed at recognising the integral role of registered nurses in delivering high-quality care for our older Australians. Registered nurses who work for the same aged care provider for 12 months will be eligible to receive a payment. Full-time nurses can receive \$3,700 and payments for part-time/casual nurses will be determined on a pro-rata basis.

An additional payment of \$2,300 will be available for registered nurses who meet one of three criteria.

- If they work in a rural or remote area
- Hold a postgraduate qualification
- Take on additional leadership or training responsibilities in their workplace.

Employers are responsible for applying on behalf of their eligible registered nurses.

Registered nurses must be employed for 12 months by any of the following:

- An approved aged care provider funded by the Australian Government
- Multipurpose Service Providers that offer aged care services
- State or local government approved Residential Aged Care or Home Care Providers
- Providers that offer aged care services under the Commonwealth National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Flexible Aged Care Program

An agency employing aged care registered nurses to work in one of the above organisation types. The Government have said the number of registered nurses working in aged care will be increased and strengthened, particularly in rural and remote areas, under a new payment aimed at rewarding clinical skills and leadership.

Minister for Health and Aged Care, Greg Hunt, and Minister for Senior Australians and Aged Care Services, Richard Colbeck, said the Morrison Government was committed to reinforcing clinical support for senior Australians in residential care.
