

Welcome to the September 2025 edition of IPC News.



A big hello from Brighton in the UK, where I am attending the Infection Prevention Society 2025 conference. A great opportunity to network with international partners, hear the latest research and practice innovations as well as the opportunity to present some Australian research.

IPC Week is just around the corner (19-25 October) and I'm excited to announce that this year we've partnered with the Australasian Society for Infectious Diseases (ASID) to develop a suite of new resources for you to use in your workplace and community. This year's theme — STAND UPP for IPC — calls on us all to Unite. Prevent, Protect, and Prevail. With global events continuing to test health systems and undermine hard-won gains in IPC, there has never been a more urgent time to redouble our efforts. I hope you'll use the <u>resources we've</u> created and take the opportunity to raise awareness, educate, and engage your networks.

Another opportunity to contribute to the future of IPC is by nominating for the ACIPC Board of Directors. Nominations are now open (see page 6) and this year we are also seeking expressions of interest for the role of President-Elect, with Dr Sally Havers stepping into the role of President this November. Serving on the Board is a fantastic way to contribute to the strategic direction of the College and help shape the future of IPC across the region. Nominations close at 9:00 AM AEDT on Monday 13 October - I encourage you to consider putting yourself forward.

Make sure you pencil in your diary the date for the virtual town hall on Wednesday 15 October at 12:00 PM AEDT, where we'll present the findings from our recent credentialling review. This work, conducted by Nous Group, helps ensure our credentialling framework continues to support and recognise IPC professionals across all settings in a contemporary fashion. You will have received an email with details on how to register — I hope to see many of you there.

We have been continuing our advocacy work in the area of indoor air quality and infection disease transmission. Late August we co-chaired a symposium with the Australian Academy of Science, the Burnet Institute, The university of Melbourne and the Victorian Healthcare Association. The symposium was very well received and an avenue to present the latest science on indoor air quality and get a conversation happening with health leaders.

And finally, a reminder to add your voice to our campaign calling for IPC to be formally included in the design of the new Australian Centre for Disease Control. You can take part in just a few clicks by visiting our campaign page and generating a letter to your local MP. Thank you to everyone who has supported the campaign so far — your voice matters, and together we can ensure IPC remains central to public health policy. We have submitted amendments to the Senate for the proposed legislation.

The Australian Government is progressing plans for a new **Australian Centre for Disease Control (CDC).**

This presents a unique opportunity to strengthen our nation's ability to prevent and respond to infectious diseases.

The Australian College of Infection Prevention and Control (ACIPC) is calling for formal representation of infection prevention and control (IPC) within the CDC.

We request your support in advocating for the integration of IPC expertise in the Australian CDC to:

- Prepare for and respond to future pandemics with expert IPC guidance
- Develop a coordinated, national IPC infrastructure across jurisdictions
- Standardise IPC practices across healthcare and community settings
- Strengthen IPC collaboration and capacity in our region, particularly in the Pacific
- Establish a national surveillance program for healthcare-associated infections
- Support long-term investment in IPC research, education, and surveillance.

We need your voice to make this happen.

We have prepared an online campaign to email your local MP, urging them to support our advocacy. It's quick and easy, just enter your address, and our tool will find your local MP, populate the letter, and send it with one click.

Numbers matter – decision-makers pay attention when constituents speak up. By sending this, you are helping to protect the health of our communities and strengthen Australia's capacity to respond to infectious disease threats.

Thank you for taking the time to support this vital advocacy effort. Please share this message with your colleagues - the more voices we have, the stronger our impact.

Together, we can ensure IPC is recognised as essential to Australia's public health future.



MEMBER PROFILE Amanda Ayres

Director I Infection Prevention Control Unit Infectious Disease Service Loddon Mallee Infection Control Resource Centre



Tell me about your career so far and what led you to working in IPC?

I began in Medical Imaging where I was an Infection Control liaison nurse. In 2008, a 12-month hand hygiene coordinator/ICP role came up with the Infection Prevention and Control Unit. With encouragement from my boss and the mentorship of Jane Hellsten, I took the leap — and that "temporary" job became permanent.

Since then, I've held several roles: Regional Hand Hygiene Coordinator with Hand Hygiene Australia, travelling the Loddon Mallee region; IPC and Infectious Diseases at Bendigo Health; and, during COVID, Aged Care Lead for the region, providing everything from remote advice to on-site outbreak support.

I've also kept learning — completing a Graduate Diploma and a Masters through Griffith University midpandemic. IPC has been the best career decision; even through challenges, I love what I do every day.

What do you love most about your job?

The team. Jane, my mentor, built a strong, supportive group that became even closer during the pandemic when we were the only point of contact for many in crisis. That experience cemented our camaraderie.

Everyone brings unique strengths — IT, data, education, clinical expertise — and as manager I love helping them shine. A typical day starts on the wards at 7am, supporting staff with isolation or microbiology questions, followed by team huddles and project work. It's never repetitive — there's always something new.

Beyond Bendigo, I'm part of the Rural Infection Control Practice Group (RICPRAC), which has benchmarked and audited across Victoria for 20+ years. It's an invaluable network for sharing ideas and maintaining high standards. At the heart of it, I love the mix of teamwork, variety, and the chance to make a difference every day.

What are you most passionate about in IPC?

My team is my biggest passion. When Jane retired as Director in 2023, I stepped into her role and I try to carry on her legacy of prioritising "team fit" — recruiting people who not only have skills but share values and resilience.

I'm also passionate about the bigger picture. I've long been interested in One Health and how global mobility and climate change reshape infectious diseases — from Dengue and TB to Avian flu and Mpox. IPC isn't just hand hygiene; it's about creative solutions to complex problems. That mix of teamwork, science, and global thinking keeps me energised.

What are the main changes you have seen in the field in recent years?

Rapid diagnostic tests have been a major change. We've trialled multi-RATs in ED, and results now come much faster. Emerging threats like Mpox, Candida auris, and CPOs also keep us alert, especially with patients from overseas and metro hospitals.

Electronic medical records have shifted practice too. Improved data extraction supports projects like PIVC management and auditing VIP scores more accurately. Genomic sequencing is now standard, helping us track resistance patterns and guide AMS work. Together, these advances give us a clearer picture and faster responses.

Do you think patients are better informed about their own health since the pandemic?

Absolutely. Patients are more informed and expect to be partners in their care. We use posters encouraging people to speak up about sore or red PIVCs, empowering them to take part in their treatment. There's also greater openness. If something goes wrong, patients are informed immediately, and their choices respected — even if they decline treatment. Many hospitals now have patient engagement officers and committees ensuring the patient voice is heard.

For IPC, that means making sure people in isolation understand why they're there, and encouraging staff to talk with them, not just stand at the door. Patients cope much better when included and informed — it's about respect, dignity, and giving them some control.

What advice would you give to those just starting out in their career?

Start slow and learn from the team. We buddy new consultants across different areas so they see the breadth of IPC — ward rounds, data, education — before finding their niche.

I recommend studying once settled — whether ACIPC Foundations, a Grad Cert, or Masters. Knowing microorganisms, epidemiology, and guidelines is vital for giving sound IPC advice.

Mentorship is also key. Jane always encouraged leadership growth, and I do the same — exposing team members to executive meetings and decision-making so they're ready to step up.

Finally, embrace unpredictability. Every day is different — one phone call can change everything. Some find that stressful, but I thrive on it. IPC is about creating order out of chaos, and if you enjoy that, you'll love the work.

Any interesting hobbies you'd like to share with us?

I'm a big fan of Barre — a mix of ballet, yoga, and Pilates — and I find it energising. I also enjoy the gym and walking, but barre is my favourite way to unwind.

Outside of that, my husband and I have a wonderful group of friends. We love concerts and weekends away, and we've been lucky to see bands like Fleetwood Mac and the Eagles. Music, movement, and time with friends are what recharge me after a busy week.

Waitematā currently carries out approximately >2500 surgeries per year and in 2024 the IP team began a quality improvement project to develop a systematic surveillance system and deepdive investigation of C-section Infections with the aim of improving pt outcomes. The results identified that the existing data collection system had discrepancies which led to the production of inaccurate reporting data – and no deep dive investigations completed on the noted infections. In addition, there were documentation gaps which needed addressing. A CS SSI investigation tool was developed and engagement form the maternity quality Improvement lead sought. Challenges around engagement of teams from maternity and obstetrics were encountered – alongside issues aligning data generated by clinical coding versus ICNET data.

The findings have highlighted factors such as antibiotic dosing alongside management of wound dressings and pt education as areas for improvement - this forms stage 2 of the project.

About the presenter:

Sandi has worked in Infection Prevention for 25 yrs – her career spanning UK, Australia and New Zealand. She is currently working as an Infection Prevention team lead in Waitematā Auckland New Zealand. BUG OF THE MONTH Syphilis

Carrie Spinks



What is it?

Syphilis is a sexually transmissible infection (STI) caused by the bacterium Treponema pallidum. It progresses through primary, secondary, latent, and tertiary stages and can cause severe complications if untreated. Syphilis may also be transmitted during pregnancy, resulting in congenital infection.

Signs and Symptoms

- **Primary:** Painless ulcer (chancre) at the infection site.
- Secondary: Rash (often on palms/ soles), fever, lymphadenopathy, mucosal lesions.
- Latent: No symptoms; infection detectable only by blood tests.
- **Tertiary:** Neurological, cardiovascular, or gummatous complications.
- **Congenital:** Stillbirth, neonatal death, or long-term disability (e.g., bone, neurological, sensory impairment).

Transmission

Spread occurs through vaginal, anal, or oral sex via direct contact with infectious lesions, or from mother to child during pregnancy or birth. Rarely, transmission may occur through blood exposure, though screening practices minimise this risk.

Those at Risk

Anyone who is sexually active can acquire syphilis. Higher prevalence occurs among men who have sex with men, people with multiple partners, and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities in remote Australia. In New Zealand, cases are increasing among women of reproductive age, raising congenital syphilis risk. Populations in Pacific Island nations also face elevated risk due to limited healthcare access.

Prevention

Condoms and dental dams reduce, but do not eliminate, risk. Regular testing in highrisk groups, early antenatal screening, and prompt treatment are essential. Partner notification and treatment, alongside public health and community education initiatives, are critical for reducing transmission.

Diagnosis

Confirmed by serology using both non-treponemal (e.g., RPR, VDRL) and treponemal tests (e.g., TPPA, EIA). Lesion swabs or dark-field microscopy may be used. Cerebrospinal fluid testing is indicated for suspected neurosyphilis.



Treatment

Benzathine penicillin G is the firstline treatment for all stages, including congenital syphilis. Alternatives such as doxycycline or ceftriaxone may be used where penicillin is unsuitable, though desensitisation is recommended during pregnancy. Follow-up serology is required to confirm cure and detect reinfection.

Current Situation in Australia & New Zealand

Australia is experiencing record-high rates, with outbreaks particularly affecting remote Indigenous communities. In 2024, over 5,500 cases were reported, and congenital syphilis deaths have already occurred in 2025. The condition has been declared a communicable disease incident of national significance. In New Zealand, cases are also rising across genders, with increasing congenital notifications prompting strengthened public health responses.

The no diaper (AKA nappy) zone - reducing CAUTI?


