







### **About ACIPC**

The Australasian College for Infection Prevention and Control is the peak body for infection prevention and control professionals (IPCPs) in the region. Our members are key practitioners and decision makers in the field of infection prevention and control and include nurses, aged care workers, industry professionals, scientists, academics, educators, and policy makers. Our vision is to reduce the burden of infection.

ACIPC seeks to be the voice for infection prevention and control professionals, focused on providing leadership, education, and evidenced-based practice for a healthy community. Whilst the COVID-19 pandemic has highlighted the importance of IPC in health and aged care settings, and the broader community, our members continue to address challenges such as hospital acquired infections (HAIs) and antibiotic resistance.

The College supports our members and IPC in the broader community through our activities, including:

- Education for members and non-members
- Advocacy on the importance of IPC to government and the community
- Collaboration with other health associations and international IPC organisations
- Publishing original research in our journal Infection, Disease and Health
- Communication to our members and stakeholders, including our newsletter IPC News
- Representation on national and international panels, committees and working groups
- Our credentialling pathway to strengthen the roles of IPCPs

The College commenced in January 2012 bringing together the various State and Territory infection control associations to support and encourage collaboration across Australasia.

The College is a company, limited by guarantee and incorporated under the Corporations Act. We are a registered charity with the Australian Charity and Not-for-Profit Commission (ACNC) and are endorsed as a Deductible Gifts Recipient (DGR).

Overall responsibility for the College is vested in the Board of Directors, chaired by the President. An Executive Management Committee (EMC) of the President, President-Elect and Past-President, provide day-to-day oversight of the College's operation, which are managed by an Executive Manager and office staff.

# **President's Report**

Associate Professor Stéphane Bouchoucha President and Chair of Executive Management Committee



### It is my great pleasure to present the ACIPC President's Report for 2025.

Again, this year, Infection Prevention and Control Professionals have continued to operate in a very complex world. The threat of emerging pathogens with outbreak and epidemic potential is very real, health services continue to sustain pressures, and there remain ongoing workforce challenges. You have all shown unwavering dedication to IPC with considerable expertise and resilience, continuing to ensure safe care, protect the most vulnerable in our community while upholding the highest standards of IPC. On behalf of the College, I extend my deep appreciation to each and every one of you.

### **Delivering Strategic Priorities**

This year, we have continued to deliver against our Strategic Plan, advancing priorities across advocacy, education, resources, and professional recognition.

A major focus has been strengthening ACIPC's role as the peak body for IPC in Australasia. Throughout 2025, we have represented members in high-level national conversations, provided expert advice to stakeholders, and ensured the voice of IPC professionals remains front and centre.

### **Advocacy and Representation**

ACIPC released three significant Position Statements this year:

- The Use of PFR Masks for the Management of COVID-19
- Terminology for Pathogens That Transmit Through the Air
- Advocacy for Inclusion of IPC in the Australian Centre for Disease Control (CDC)

Each of these works contributes to clarity, safety, and strong national IPC practice. Several other statements are currently under revision to ensure they remain contemporary and evidence based. We have worked with many prominent institutions such as The Australian Academy of Sciences to advocate for our members.

One of our most visible advocacy initiatives has been the national campaign calling for the inclusion of IPC representation in the Australian Centre for Disease Control (CDC). It has been inspiring to see so many of our members actively contact their local MPs and amplify this message within their organisations.

ACIPC strongly supports the establishment of the Australian CDC. We, however, remain deeply concerned that the proposed framework does not include embedded IPC expertise. Without this, national responsiveness to emerging threats and preparedness for future pandemics will be severely hindered. IPC must be recognised as a cornerstone capability of a modern public health system in a whole of community approach to IPC.

Our message to government remains clear: a CDC without IPC risks achieving neither prevention nor control of infectious diseases. Through advocacy, we have also continued to underscore the urgent need for a national surveillance program for healthcareassociated infections, ensuring Australia keeps pace with international standards.

# Strengthening Governance and Ethical Practice

In line with our strategic priorities, the ACIPC Board undertook a comprehensive review of the College's committee system. Thank you to everyone who attended the update session in March and contributed constructive feedback.

Refining committee structures ensures alignment with our strategic goals, support sustainability, and improve how we mobilise expertise across the College.

Also in March, the Board endorsed the Ethical Infection Prevention and Control (EIPAC)
Decision-Making Framework developed by APIC and IPAC Canada. This resource equips IPC professionals with a structured approach to navigating ethical dilemmas in practice.
We are pleased to support the dissemination of this important work and to provide our members with tools that reflect the complexity of modern IPC decision-making, ensuring however that we keep individuals and their loved ones at the centre.

### **Education and Credentialling**

ACIPC delivered a suite of education offerings again this year that comprises five different courses, continuing our commitment to capability development across the sector. A total of 1300 students enrolled, and 35 courses were delivered. The demand for specialised IPC education remains strong, and we are grateful to our expert facilitators, partners, and students.

In response to members' feedback, we engaged Nous Group to undertake an independent review of the ACIPC Credentialling Framework. The final report, presented in October, provides valuable recommendations to ensure credentialling continues to recognise diverse career pathways and support workforce progression well into the future. My sincere thanks to all who contributed through surveys, forums, or interviews.

### **Collaboration and Impact**

Our engagement with the Safer Air Project continued this year, advocating for improved indoor air quality as a core determinant of infection transmission prevention.

We also partnered with the Healthcare Infection Control Special Interest Group (HICSIG) and the Australian Vascular Access Society (AVAS) to deliver interim guidance on alternative antisepsis products, following product recalls and manufacturing changes. I would particularly like to acknowledge Board Directors Dr Sally Havers and Janine Caruccan, whose expertise contributed significantly to this important resource.

Our advocacy with the Australian Commission on Safety and Quality in Health Care (ACSQHC) resulted in updates to the Aged Care Infection Prevention and Control Guide. While further refinement is needed, these changes better align the guide with the Australian Guidelines for the Prevention and Control of Infection in Healthcare (2019) and real-world aged care needs. This responsiveness reflects the value of our partnership in strengthening safety where it matters most.

# Governance, Sustainability and Member Support

At the ACIPC Annual General Meeting on 19 November, we shared strong progress across education, credentialling, advocacy, member engagement, and operational performance during the year. I am pleased to report that the College remains financially sound, enabling us to plan confidently for future growth and expanded services.

#### **Closing Reflections**

As my term as ACIPC President comes to a close, I want to express my heartfelt thanks to our membership, Board Directors, Committee Chairs, Faculty, our staff, our Executive Manager and the Secretariat team. It has been an honour and privilege to serve alongside vou.

Our field tends to make good headlines when things go wrong, but what does not make headlines is that every day, IPC professionals prevent harm, preserve life, and protect community wellbeing. The work you do matters. It is meaningful and leaves a legacy.

I am delighted to be handing responsibility to Dr Sally Havers, whose leadership, knowledge, and commitment to our profession will continue to strengthen the College.

Thank you for your dedication, your excellence, and your tireless pursuit of safe care for all.

Dr Stéphane Bouchoucha is an Associate Professor and Associate Head of School (International) in the School of Nursing and Midwifery at Deakin University. He is also a researcher based in Deakin's Institute for Health Transformation and the Centre for Innovation in Infectious Disease and Immunology Research.

With nearly 30 years' experience as a registered nurse and an academic, Stéphane has worked in a variety of clinical (critical care, infection prevention, and leadership and management) and community settings. 



## **Executive Manager Report**

Ben Thiessen Executive Manager



The 2024/25 year has been one of continued progress and consolidation for the College. The office supports activities across committees, education, professional development, and representation and advocacy to further position ACIPC as the peak body for infection prevention and control across Australasia.

The College's staff continue to support the Board's strategic aims - governance, advocacy, member support, education and professional development, and sustainability. This includes involvement across committees and special interest groups, supporting advocacy through the preparation of representation papers and position statements, contributing to resource development, delivering education and training programs, and coordinating initiatives such as the Aged Care Community of Practice. The team's engagement in these areas ensures that the College's strategic priorities are translated into effective outcomes and meaningful member impact.

Our education program remains the cornerstone of the College's success. Under the leadership of our Education Manager, Jackie Miley, 35 courses were delivered this year to 1300 students, supported by 11 dedicated facilitators. The continued success of the Foundations of Infection Prevention and Control (FIPC) course, together with the expansion of education offerings into new sectors including aged care, veterinary health, and international delivery, has strengthened the College's reputation for high-quality IPC education. The Aged Care Community of Practice, led by IPC Consultant, Carrie Spinks, has continued to grow in strength and engagement.

Carrie's regular webinars have been extremely well attended and, together with discussion forums and sector-specific resources, have supported IPC Leads in implementing best practice infection control. This initiative has become an important support network for aged care IPC Leads across Australia. IPC Consultant, Karen McKenna, has continued to support the Advancing IPC Committee and guide the Sustainability SIG, contributing to the development and review of position statements, practice guidelines, and national submissions.

I would like to acknowledge and thank the ACIPC team — the office team led by Caroline, and supported by Trish, Tracy, and Sasha; Jackie, directing the delivery of our education courses; Carrie and Karen, providing IPC support; and Selina, managing communications — for their professionalism, commitment, and teamwork throughout the year. Their collective effort ensures the smooth operation and continued success of the College.

I look forward to continuing to work with the Board, Committees, and members as we advance the College's mission and strategic aims.

The Representation and Advocacy
Committee was formed as a new Committee
for the College in 2025. The committee
first convened in May 2025 with the
aim of enhancing ACIPC's presence and
influence across Australasia, promoting
infection prevention and control
through collaboration, advocacy, and
capacity-building.

#### **Achievements**

The Committee has made progress this year in advancing IPC across Australasia. Regional collaboration was strengthened through work on a Memorandum of Understanding with the Infection Prevention & Control Nurses College (IPCNC) in New Zealand and ongoing support for Pacific capacity-building via PICNet, credentialing initiatives, and the International Foundations of IPC Course. Advocacy and communication were key focuses, with input into a new ACIPC media policy and strategies to extend ACIPC's voice into New Zealand and Pacific outlets. Partnerships and alliances were deepened with WHO, APSIC, MSF, and GOARN, and the Veterinary IPC Foundations Course was promoted through regional health and veterinary networks. Inclusivity and consumer engagement progressed through plans for credentialing Pacific IPC focal points and initiatives to embed consumer voices in education and practice, in collaboration with health consumer peak bodies.

The Committee also promoted IPC within One Health initiatives, emphasising its importance across human, animal, and environmental health systems.

### **Opportunities Ahead**

- Formalise MoUs with IPCNC and other regional partners to enhance IPC's regional strength.
- Incorporate consumer voices via training and support for IPC professionals.
- Expand ACIPC's media presence and advocacy across the region.
- Strengthen engagement in One Health to support IPC's role across sectors.
- The Committee is dedicated to elevating the profile of IPC and ensuring ACIPC is acknowledged as the trusted voice for infection prevention and control across Australasia.

### The 2025 ACIPC conference will be held between the 16th - 19th November 2025 in Hobart, Tasmania at the Hotel Grand Chancellor, and online.

The theme of this years conference is 'Circles of Influence – evidence based practice and practice based evidence'. The theme reflects the reality of IPC – we use research-based evidence where it is available, but we also try out practices and projects before we have the research to back it up.

The theme is around the importance of research but also around the importance of local projects, quality improvement activities, stories and the like. We need to encourage and value these in the same way that we encourage and value pure research.

To this end, the Committee devised two streams for abstract submissions – research, and project/policy. We wanted to make things a bit easier for IPC professionals who do not have a research bent or background, to submit their projects and activities to showcase them to their peers.

We had 185 abstracts submitted, with 49 accepted for free papers, 14 for lightening talks, and 110 for posters.

The themes for the invited speakers this year are a little more fluid – instead of having rigid silos concentrating on a specific topic (aged care, new research, veterinary IPC for example) we have allocated them so that there is interest across different IPC subgroups. For example – 'Microbe' has a research paper, an emerging disease, and how a disease is made notifiable. 'Place – different' has topics around the human-animal interface in Antarctica and in animal rescue, as well as patient transport. While 'Choice' is primarily around AMS but includes research and an environmental health perspective.

The plenary sessions will showcase the three international speakers, the motivational speaker, the ACIPC lecture, HICSIG, and a debate.

The three international speakers - Dr Tania Bubb, Adj. Asst Professor Surinder Pada, and Ms Patricia Ching - will each give a plenary presentation, and a 20-minute talk in the invited speakers sessions. Dr Bubb and Ms Ching will both participate in the final debate while Adj. Asst Professor Pada will Chair a free paper session.

### **Annual Conference Committee**

#### Social Calendar

There are the usual social functions – pre-conference drinks, networking breakfast, welcome reception and gala dinner. We have also added a post conference drinks function for those who may be staying on or wish to catch up again with colleagues.

#### **Awards**

The award for best oral paper and best poster have been moved from the ACIPC dinner to the final session of the conference. This is to allow for more oral presentations to be given over the 3 conference days.

### **Sponsors and Exhibitors**

Sponsorship has again been strong with only 1 gold and 1 bronze sponsorship package remaining. And of the 30 exhibitor pods, only 3 remain for sale.

### **Summary**

Changes have been made to the program and abstract formats this year which were primarily based on delegate feedback from the 2024 conference. The main changes for 2025 are:

- Two types of abstract submission
- An increase in free paper sessions
- Free papers (oral presentations) will be given over the 3 days of the conference.
- More flexibility around speakers for the themes.
- Best oral paper and best poster awards awarded at the final session of the conference

These are not major changes to the format, but a bit of a tweak. If the feedback about these changes from delegates is negative, then next year's Committee can adjust the format based on that feedback.

The conference scholarships are managed by the College and this year we have also added additional awards. The conference has achieved its sponsorship requirement with platinum, gold, and silver sponsorships and other exhibitor booths on track. This year we will again be opening the hall up to external attendees with Exhibition Visitor passes that are available to individuals likely to benefit from access to the trade exhibition, where they can explore and procure IPC-related products and services without attending the scientific program. This also provides more value to the exhibitors and promotes ACIPC.

### **Opportunities**

There are opportunities with current research still in progress across Australia and internationally, to add to next year's conference plenary speakers as well as further sessions on veterinary/One Health.

#### **Achievements**

The ACIPC Developing the Profession Committee commenced in April 2025, guided by the ACIPC strategy and member feedback, with a focus on integrating a variety of education and professional growth opportunities within ACIPC.

The ACIPC Education Program has continued to expand over 2024/25, delivering multiple courses with strong participant engagement across a growing portfolio:


- Foundations of Infection Prevention and Control (IPC) 26 courses have been delivered, supported by 11 facilitators and attended by 1097 participants.
- Foundations of Infection Prevention and Control - International 1 course was delivered to 32 participants with 2 facilitators
- **Veterinary Foundations of IPC** 1 course has been delivered with 16 participants and 1 facilitator supporting.
- Blood Borne Virus 4 courses have reached a wide audience with 80 participants and 1 facilitator guidance.
- Short Courses for Aged Care 3 have also been successfully delivered to 75 participants.

The **Lunch and Learn Webinars** have been held monthly throughout 2025, covering a diverse range of topics. Member feedback has been overwhelmingly positive. Recordings of these sessions remain accessible on the ACIPC website for members unable to attend live or wishing to revisit topics.

# The College continues to offer a wide range of courses addressing areas of concern and interest in the field of IPC.

Courses are updated regularly as healthcare settings respond to emerging knowledge and evidence based interventions to reduce transmission risks ensuring safe quality care for all healthcare users, workers and providers.

Another recent (2025) upgrade to Moodle 4.5 has further improved the appearance and functionality of our online courses.

The facilitator team continues to provide support which is tailored to students' individual needs, and assistance with the application of IPC principles to their setting. Students are encouraged and supported to use recognised reference sources, along with national standards and guidelines to support their learning, increasing confidence and competence in IPC.

Students positively evaluate the courses, and provide feedback on future IPC online learning strategies. Students report that networking and sharing insights within the confidential course platform facilitates complex problem solving and collaborative innovation.



### **Opportunities**

Following the finalisation of the ACIPC Strategic Plan, a comprehensive review of all Committees was undertaken to ensure alignment with the strategic objectives of the College. This extensive review assessed each Committee's function and structure to confirm they were operating effectively and in accordance with the strategic direction.

As part of this process, the former *Practice Guidance Committee* was restructured and renamed the *Advancing IPC & Standards Committee*. A new Chair was appointed to lead this revitalised Committee, bringing

renewed focus to its role in supporting the development of high-quality resources for members.

One of the first initiatives under the new Chair was a thorough review of existing position statements, guidelines, and other member resources. In conjunction with this, a governance framework was introduced to guide the Committee's activities. This framework is essential in ensuring that all documents produced by the Committee are evidence-based, current, and responsive to the evolving needs of members.

To support this work, a call was issued to members to join a standing panel of clinical experts. Infection Prevention and Control Professionals (ICPs) were invited to participate in topic-specific working groups aligned with their clinical expertise and interests. The formation of these working groups is currently in progress.

The Research and Science Committee has continued to play a vital role in advancing the Australasian College for Infection Prevention and Control's (ACIPC) mission to strengthen the evidence base that underpins infection prevention and control (IPC) practice. In 2024–25, the Committee focused its work on three strategic priority areas: (1) increasing research capacity, particularly in low- and middle-income (LMI) settings, Indigenous health, and aged care; (2) building the research capability of IPC professionals; and (3) improving the responsiveness and accessibility of IPC research across Australasia.

### **Increasing Research Capacity**

Over the past year, the Committee has seen encouraging growth in research activity across LMI contexts and aged care. These areas remain critically underrepresented in IPC research, and ACIPC is committed to strengthening the evidence base in ways that support equity, safety, and context specific care. Notably, there has been an increase in requests for formal letters of support from researchers undertaking projects in aged care, reflecting both the growing capacity for research in this setting and the importance of ACIPC as a partner in this area. The Research Access Scheme has also facilitated a steady rise in engagement, helping to connect researchers with clinical networks and resources that underpin high-quality studies.

# **Building Research Capability of IPC Professionals**


Supporting the professional growth of IPCs in research has remained central to the Committee's work. This year ACIPC received the highest number of submissions for conference scholarships since the establishment of the program, highlighting both the appetite and commitment of IPCs to engage in scientific forums and share their work. These opportunities not only enhance individual capability but also foster a culture of enquiry and evidence-based practice within the profession. Additionally, there has been strong uptake of research projects using the Research Access Scheme, with members seeking opportunities to contribute to and learn from collaborative projects. Representation requests to ACIPC have also increased, further positioning ACIPC and IPCs as integral contributors to multidisciplinary research teams.

# Improving Responsiveness and Accessibility of IPC Research

A key focus for the Committee has been ensuring that IPC research remains both responsive to emerging needs and accessible to practitioners and policy-makers. Through the Research Access Scheme, the College has been able to streamline connections between researchers and IPC professionals. enabling timely contributions to pressing clinical questions. The Committee continues to advocate for dissemination practices that ensure research outputs are practical, accessible, and relevant to those working at the frontline of infection prevention. The record levels of requests for partnership and representation reflect the increasing recognition of ACIPC's capacity to bridge the gap between research and practice.

The achievements of the past year are a direct result of the dedication, engagement, and efforts of the ACIPC Research and Science Committee members. Their ongoing contributions, timely out-of-session responses, and commitment to advancing the research agenda of the College have been critical to the success of our work. On behalf of ACIPC, we extend sincere thanks to all Committee members for their continued service and for ensuring that the College remains a leader in infection prevention and control research across Australasia.



# Global Outbreak Alert & Response Network Report (GOARN)



# Representative / Focal Point Dr Peta-Anne Zimmerman

#### **Overview**

In 2025, ACIPC continued its strategic partnership with the World Health Organization's Global Outbreak Alert and Response Network (GOARN). GOARN is a global mechanism comprising over 320 institutions that supports countries facing public health emergencies through alert and risk assessment, rapid response capacity, capacity strengthening, and operational research.

ACIPC contributes primarily through infection prevention and control (IPC) expertise, with additional representation in epidemiology, immunisation, microbiology, laboratory science, public health, clinical care, and social mobilisation. This partnership enables ACIPC members to engage in global health security efforts and strengthens the IPC profession across the region.

The GOARN focal point role is held voluntarily by Dr Peta-Anne Zimmerman. This role includes coordination, training, mentoring, and representation at global meetings and operational forums. ACIPC's sustained involvement positions the College as a recognised leader in outbreak response across the Western Pacific Region.

## **Rapid Response Capacity**

Between August 2024 and September 2025, ACIPC engaged with the GOARN Operational Support Team (OST) in response to multiple international emergencies, including Mpox, dengue, cholera, marburg virus disease, cyclone response, protracted emergencies, HIV, and measles.

ACIPC submitted five formal applications for deployment. While no deployments occurred during this period, this reflects the epidemiology-heavy nature of requests, a discipline not widely represented within ACIPC membership. As of September 2025, four operations remain active: Chad (Cholera), Global and multi-country support (Cholera), AFRO (Mpox preparedness and response), and DRC (Mpox).

## **Capacity Strengthening**

ACIPC led regional capacity building through GOARN Tier 1.5 and Tier 2 training initiatives.

The GOARN Tier 1.5 Virtual Training Workshop was delivered on 14-15 August 2025 in collaboration with the Queensland Infection Prevention and Control Unit (QIPCU) and the Japan Institute for Health Security (JIHS). Over 40 participants attended, with a mean workshop rating of 4.56/5 and faculty satisfaction of 4.89/5. Most valued topics included deployee stories, wellbeing strategies, and outbreak investigations.



# The partnership strengthens the IPC profession, supports member development, and positions ACIPC as a regional leader in global health security.

Participant feedback highlighted the relevance and impact of the training: "All of it has been brilliant and I feel necessary for complete understanding." "Preparation aspects discussed and advice regarding pre, during-, and post-deployment were very useful." "Great workshop – fantastic insight provided. All the facilitators were amazing."

ACIPC also served as senior faculty for the sixth time in Tier 2 simulation training, delivered in Australia and Sweden. This advanced program prepares deployable experts for high-risk, complex field operations.

In addition, ACIPC launched a four-part webinar series in September 2025 with the Korea Disease Control and Prevention Agency (KDCA) and the Asia Pacific Health Security Action Framework (APHSAF), supporting emerging partners in understanding GOARN mechanisms and deployment readiness.

## **Strategic Representation**

ACIPC continues to demonstrate leadership in outbreak response coordination through participation in the PICNet Meeting (Fiji), GOARN Research Working Group, GOARN Weekly Operations Meetings, and the upcoming GOARN Virtual Global Meeting of Partners.

## **Member Development and Opportunities**

ACIPC's GOARN partnership provides direct benefits to members, including access to WHO-led training and simulation programs, eligibility for deployment to international outbreak responses, participation in global research and coordination forums, and opportunities for professional development and international collaboration.

Members were also eligible for the GOARN Berlin Fellowship Program, which supports skill development in outbreak response coordination, research, and field deployment.

#### **Future Goals**

ACIPC will continue to strengthen its GOARN partnership through the following priorities: expanding member eligibility and readiness for deployment, increasing IPC representation in global operations, formalising regional leadership roles, promoting ACIPC-led contributions to GOARN research, advocating for IPC inclusion in response teams, and developing a regional IPC deployment roster.

#### Conclusion

ACIPC's engagement with GOARN reflects a substantial voluntary commitment and a high volume of strategic activity. The partnership strengthens the IPC profession, supports member development, and positions ACIPC as a regional leader in global health security. The work completed in 2025 demonstrates the College's capacity to contribute meaningfully to international outbreak preparedness and response.

# **ACIPC Aged Care Infection Prevention & Control Community of Practice**

The Aged Care Infection Prevention and Control (IPC) Community of Practice (CoP) entered its second year, providing a dedicated space for IPC collaboration across Australasia.

The CoP consisted of an open-access platform that integrated resources, templates, educational materials, collaboration pathways, and an interactive webinar series. It remained freely accessible to all working in, supporting, or engaging with aged care and is hosted on the Australasian College for Infection Prevention and Control (ACIPC) website under the 'Aged Care' space.

Aged care is undergoing significant reform with the passing of the Aged Care Act 2024, which heightened care obligations and embedded person-centred care. From 1 November 2025, providers were required to comply with the new Aged Care Act Rules and Strengthened Standards, including obligations for robust IPC systems. ACIPC is supporting providers in preparing for these reforms through the CoP.

#### **Aged Care Connexion**

The web-based Aged Care Connexion forum enabled users to post IPC-related questions and receive peer responses. In 2024–25, utilisation increased with 77 posted questions and 106 replies. Topics were diverse and sector-specific, providing reliable advice in an area previously marked by gaps in targeted IPC guidance.

# Aged Care IPC Resources, Templates and Tools

The Aged Care IPC Resource bank was regularly updated to provide curated, current, and reliable materials to meet reform requirements and changing practice.

ACIPC continued to partner with aged care providers to expand its repository of successfully implemented practical tools, adaptable to varying environments. New additions included a toolbox for reprocessing reusable equipment, rolespecific gloving guides, and family information resources.

Collaboration with Companion Animal Network Australia, the Australian Veterinarians in Public Health Special Interest Group, and the Australian Veterinarian Association Policy and Advocacy Team produced a bundle of seven resources. These supported safe co-residence arrangements for older people and their pets while maintaining IPC standards.



ACIPC continued to partner with aged care providers to expand its repository of successfully implemented practical tools, adaptable to varying environments.

## **Aged Care IPC Webinar series**

In January 2025, the CoP webinar series increased from bi-monthly to monthly in response to demand. Hosted by the ACIPC IPC Consultant, sessions featured subject experts and used polls, word clouds, and chat functions to foster collaboration. Recordings and slides were made available online, and unanswered questions were redirected to the Aged Care Connexion forum.

Webinar registrations ranged from 327 to 752, with an average of 478 (see below for full year statistics). Attendance was strongest in Victoria and New South Wales but also included participants from Queensland, Western Australia, South Australia, Tasmania, the Northern Territory, and New Zealand.

Attendees represented residential care, home care, public, private, and not-for-profit services. Roles included IPC leads, RNs and ENs, clinical governance, aged care IPC Consultants, public health staff, aged care operational management and environmental service management.

# Aged Care News and Events and IPC in Focus presentation library

The dedicated News and Events page was updated throughout the year with sector developments.

The on-demand Aged Care IPC in Focus library also expanded within the year, increasing to 13 recorded presentations on topics such as governance, environmental services, multi-resistant organism management, and train-the-trainer programs.

#### **Governance and Education**

In early 2025, a working group commenced development of a three-part Governance and Leadership Webinar Series for residential care leaders. Progress was delayed by evolving drafts of the Aged Care Act Rules and Strengthened Standards, as well as the extension of compliance deadlines to November 2025. Delivery is now rescheduled for early 2026 to allow for finalisation of directions and sector adjustment.

ACIPC also continued to deliver an Aged Care IPC Education Pathway, comprising the Short Course in Infection Prevention and Control in Aged Care Settings and the Foundations of Infection Prevention and Control. Both courses were updated in 2024–25 to reflect aged care obligations and contemporary practice, with enhancements in areas such as clinical governance, antimicrobial stewardship, and practice change.



# **ACIPC Aged Care Infection Prevention & Control Community of Practice**

#### **Research and Conference**

National aged care IPC research investment expanded through MRFF and NHMRC funding in 2024-25. The ACIPC IPC Consultant is contributing to three major projects: IMMERSE-2 (implementing IPC in residential care through CoPs), A-PRECISE (preventing infections in residential aged care), and Safe at Home (surveillance of infection and antimicrobial use in home care).

The 2024 ACIPC International Conference hosted the largest aged care program to date, featuring eight speakers and three interactive sessions in the Sunday workshop, alongside three dedicated conference sessions with 10 invited speakers, a plenary, and three abstract presenters. The strong representation was widely praised by delegates.

## **Collaborations with Governing Bodies**

ACIPC maintained close collaboration with the Department of Health, Disability and Ageing (DHDA) and the Australian Commission on Safety and Quality in Health Care (ACSQHC). In April 2025, the ACSQHC released an updated Aged Care IPC Guide incorporating ACIPC feedback, providing greater clarity for the sector. The DHDA promoted CoP webinars through newsletters and continued to engage with ACIPC on education, training, and research initiatives.

It's been a long time since SA SIG members have met, exactly 5 years ago in the first year of COVID-19. Reestablishing the SIG was to provide a network for members with a particular interest to develop their professional skills, exchange views and information, and to guide the career aspirations of our up-and-coming junior members. The SIG is supported by three cochairs Marija Juraja, Nicole Vause and Lisa Ryan, all experienced Infection Control Professionals (ICP) from diverse backgrounds.

The objective of the SA SIG is to engage locally with both state members and non-members, provide opportunities to learn about the latest research or share quality improvement initiatives and engage with corporate members (if possible) to see new innovations on the market.

To date we have held four successful meetings via a hybrid model at the Royal Adelaide Hospital Lecture Theatre. The topics varied from AS5369 updates, Residential Aged Care standards and challenges, mentoring and culture change and finally Blue Mirror provided an opportunity for our members to interact with new AI technology to test their knowledge.

To date we have had great attendance both in person and on-line with positive feedback. The ability to deliver these sessions in a hybrid model has opened opportunity to meet, greet and discuss what ICP would like to see with education delivery including regional members, with two more meetings planned for September 18th and December 11th.

It has been an exciting year establishing and developing the ACIPC Paediatric Infection Prevention and Control Special Interest Group (Paeds SIG), created to address an existing gap in paediatric-focused IPC professional development and support.

It has been an exciting year establishing and developing the ACIPC Paediatric Infection Prevention and Control Special Interest Group (Paeds SIG), created to address an existing gap in paediatric-focused IPC professional development and support.

We have appointed a Paeds SIG leadership group which includes paediatric IPC leaders in tertiary care health facilities across five Australian jurisdictions: New South Wales, Queensland, Victoria, Western Australia, and South Australia. Since inception of the SIG, the leadership group has worked collaboratively to develop the SIG's Terms of Reference and establish a professional network for colleagues working in clinical settings involving neonates, children, and young people. This network aims to foster professional growth, facilitate knowledge exchange, and support the career development of emerging professionals in the field.

In 2025, we delivered a series of monthly remote meetings via Zoom, alternating between leadership group meetings and open meetings, the latter which openly invited ACIPC members and other health professionals with an interest in paediatric IPC. To date, four open meetings have been delivered, each focusing on relevant and engaging topics that generated good discussion and provided opportunities for attendees to share ideas and strategies. These meetings have attracted a high number of registrants and attendees, providing evidence that this group is addressing a need in the IPC community.

The SIG leadership group has convened six times since November 2024. These meetings have been instrumental in establishing the SIG's foundation, agreeing on strategic priorities, developing and delivering open meetings, and facilitating the exchange of jurisdictional and tertiary hospital IPC insights, resources and solutions to complex IPC challenges in paediatric care.

Looking ahead to the remainder of 2025, the leadership group will focus on developing a comprehensive schedule for 2026, informed by our experiences to date and aimed at enhancing the visibility and impact of Paeds SIG activities within ACIPC. Members attending the 2025 ACIPC Conference are planning to meet in person—a valuable opportunity to celebrate our achievements and strengthen our collaborative efforts.

The ACIPC Sustainability SIG was established in 2025 to provide a platform for members to address the increasing need for sustainable approaches in healthcare and to align IPC practices with sustainability.



A group of ACIPC members working in diverse healthcare settings across Australia and New Zealand formed a working group to plan the Sustainability SIG, with a focus on creating a platform for learning and exchanging ideas and knowledge, to drive research and innovation and to develop a platform to facilitate networking for members.

The first meeting was held online in July, with Dr Susan Jain presenting on Aligning Infection Prevention with Net Zero goals in NSW, 110 members registered to attend the event, and survey feedback was positive. Two further meetings are planned for 2025, with a presentation on the carbon literacy program and implementation of successful carbon reduction strategies in a WA healthcare setting, and the Royal Melbourne Hospitals Dr Ben Dunne presenting on the reusable surgical gown project in November.

The Sustainability SIG will continue in 2026, with a focus on showcasing IPC sustainability strategies that have been implemented in healthcare settings.

### 1. Statement of Significant Accounting Policies

The financial statements are general purpose financial statements that have been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards (including Australian Accounting Interpretations) of the Australian Accounting Standards Board and the Corporations Act 2001.

Australian Accounting Standards set out accounting policies that the AASB has concluded would result in financial statements containing relevant and reliable information about transactions, events and conditions. Compliance with Australian Accounting Standards ensures that the financial statements and notes also comply with International Financial Reporting Standards. Material accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are presented below and have been consistently applied unless otherwise stated.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs, modified where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financials liabilities.

#### Income Tax

The entity is exempt from income tax under Section 50 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997. Accordingly no income tax is provided for in the accounts.

#### Property, Plant and Equipment

Property, plant and equipment is initially recorded at the cost of acquisition or fair value less, if applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Plant and equipment that has been contributed at no cost, or for nominal cost, is valued and recognised at the fair value of the asset at the date it is acquired. The plant and equipment is reviewed annually by the directors to ensure that the carrying amount is not in excess of the recoverable amount from these assets. The recoverable amount is assessed on the basis of the expected net cash flows that will be received from the utilisation of the assets and the subsequent disposal. The expected net cash flows have been discounted to their present values in estimating recoverable amounts.

Freehold land and buildings are measured at their fair value, based on periodic, but at least triennial, valuations by independent external valuers, less subsequent depreciation for buildings.

Increases in the carrying amount of land and buildings arising on revaluation are credited in equity to a revaluation surplus. Decreases against previous increases of the same asset are charged against fair value reserves in equity. All other decreases are charged to profit or loss.

Any accumulated depreciation at the date of revaluation is offset against the gross carrying amount of the asset and the net amount is restated to the revalued amount of the asset.

#### **Trade and Other Receivables**

Trade receivables and other receivables, including distributions receivable, are recognised at the nominal transaction value without taking into account the time value of money. If required a provision for doubtful debt has been created.

## **Trade and Other Payables**

Trade and other payables represent the liabilities for goods and services received by the company that remain unpaid at 30 June 2025. Trade payables are recognised at their transaction price. They are subject to normal credit terms and do not bear interest.

## Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held on call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts.
