The Australian College of Infection Prevention and Control (ACIPC) is calling for formal representation of infection prevention and control (IPC) within the CDC.

- Standardise IPC practices across healthcare and community settings

INVITED SPEAKERS

Associate Professor Noleen Bennett *Infection Control Consultant*



Noleen Bennett is a senior Infection Prevention and Control consultant, employed at both the Victorian Healthcare Associated Infection Surveillance System (VICNISS) Coordinating Centre and National Centre for Antimicrobial Stewardship (NCAS). She oversees multiple aged care surveillance initiatives:

- **1. VICNISS Aged Care Infection Indicator Program**; 170 public residential aged care homes (RACHs) continuously participate,
- 2. Aged Care National Antimicrobial Prescribing Survey:

823 RACHs participated in 2023,

- **3. National infection Surveillance Program for Aged Care (NISPAC) project:** 64 RACHs participated in the pilot, and
- **4. Safe At Home research project.** These surveillance programs include a suite of modules that monitor infections and antimicrobial use.

Joyce Roache-Levaai

Principal Officer Infection Prevention & Control, Ministry of Health, Samoa



Joyce Roache-Levaai is the Principal Infection Prevention and Control Officer for the Ministry of Health in Samoa with 13-years' experience in IPC, following 7-years of Nursing in the Paediatric Unit and 1-year in the Outpatient Department.

She obtained her Bachelor Degree of Nursing in 2006 from the National University of Samoa, and later went on to pursue a Graduate Diploma in Infection Prevention and Control from the Waiariki Institute of Technology, New Zealand in 2015.

She is a certified Hand Hygiene Gold Standard Auditor and is an active member of the Pacific Infection Prevention and Control Network (PICNet) and current chair for both PICNet and PICNet Technical Working Group.

Professor Geraint Rogers

Director, Microbiology and Host Health Programme, SAHMRI



Professor Geraint Rogers is a microbiologist and Director of the Microbiome and Host Health Program at the South Australian Health and Medical Research Institute. He holds a conjoint professorial appointment at Flinders University and is internationally recognised for his work on microbial ecology and its impact on human health. His research focuses on the role of the microbiome in ageing, infection, chronic disease, and antimicrobial resistance, with a strong translational emphasis. He has published extensively, leads multidisciplinary teams, and is committed to advancing microbiome science to inform healthcare innovation and improve patient outcomes.

Dr Megan Young

Public Health Physician, Metro North Public Health Unit



Dr Megan Young is a public health physician at the Metro North Public Health Unit in Brisbane. She holds a PhD in Public Health and Adjunct Associate Professor positions at the University of Queensland and Griffith University. Her research interests in notifiable conditions have led to more than 50 publications. She regularly sits on State and National communicable disease policy working groups, recently including the working group responsible for the national public health guideline for measles. She also has significant experience leading the public health response to notified measles cases.

The Last of Us: Infection Prevention and Control, Global Disruption, and Circles of Influence.

Abstract

In an age where health is tested by politics, conflict, and collective fatigue, infection prevention and control (IPC) stands at the fault line between endurance and collapse. Drawing on *The Last of Us* as a mirror to our times, this lecture explores what happens when systems fracture, trust erodes, and fear spreads faster than facts. Still, people keep showing up to protect others. Through the lens of global disruption and shared professional experience, it examines how IPC holds both the line and the memory of what matters: evidence, integrity, and care. It considers the circles of influence that shape our field, from global governance to local leadership, and asks how we sustain moral courage and human connection when the world feels like it is tearing itself apart. As it is for us, *The Last of Us* is not a story of endings but of the quiet strength of those who stay. Infection prevention and control remains a quiet act of defiance. It is a commitment to protect, connect, and uphold what matters. In every circle of influence, no matter how small, there is power in choosing care.

Dr Peta-Anne Zimmerman is an internationally respected clinician, educator and researcher in infection prevention and control. Dr Zimmerman's experience includes consultancy work with the World Health Organization (WHO), the Australian Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade (DFAT), AusAlD, the Asian Development Bank (ADB), the Pacific Community (SPC). Her expertise has led her to work extensively in China, South East Asia, and the South Pacific, directly on outbreak response, and the development of comprehensive infection prevention and control programmes, infrastructure development and renovation, and integration of public health and acute care response in infectious disease emergencies in low- and middle-income country settings. Peta-Anne is a Board Director of the Australasian College for Infection Prevention and Control (ACIPC), ACIPC representative and senior faculty for the Global Outbreak Alert and Response Network (GOARN), and member of the ACIPC Credentialling and Professional Practices (CAPS) Committee.

Peta-Anne directs the Graduate Infection Prevention and Control Program at Griffith University and is a Visiting Research Fellow with the Gold Coast Hospital and Health Service, Australia. Her research focus is infection prevention and control, public health, and outbreak response, including novel approaches to the teaching and learning of this discipline, and health education in general.

Shelley: The Langmore Centre is a 60-bed private mental health hospital providing inpatient and day-patient care. Our alcohol and other drugs unit supports detox and recovery from substances including alcohol, methamphetamine, cannabis, and prescription medications.

We also offer an ADHD program for assessment, diagnosis, and treatment of complex ADHD, plus a 27-bed mental health unit for anxiety, depression, trauma, and personality disorders.

Our 14-bed unit supports emergency services and defence personnel with PTSD or anxiety, and our day programs help people maintain recovery and build healthy, meaningful lives.

What does IPC practice look like in your setting?

Priscilla: Coming from an acute care background, I've had to rethink what infection prevention looks like in a mental health setting. In acute care, infection meant isolation and strict precautions — but that doesn't work here. Our patients are in rehabilitation, and connection is part of their recovery. I've learned so much from Shelley about finding that balance between maintaining safety and supporting recovery in a compassionate, realistic way.

Shelley: Every day is about managing risks while keeping treatment meaningful. Most of our patients are mobile, spending time in group therapy and social settings, so IPC here is about creative problemsolving. During the peak of COVID, for example, we had to weigh up the infection risk against the harm of isolation. Sometimes that meant switching to telehealth, discharging someone to recover at home, or spacing them apart in group sessions — but always with empathy. It's really about doing the most good with the least harm: keeping people safe while ensuring they still feel connected, supported, and cared for.

Do you work with the patients on IPC education as well as staff?

Priscilla: Absolutely — education is a big part of what we do, not just for staff but for patients too. Mental health nursing is quite different from acute care, so we've done a lot of hands-on training with staff around things like PPE use, swabbing, and specimen collection — skills they might not have used much before. There's also a lot of reassurance involved, helping both staff and patients feel confident that infection prevention can be part of care without feeling clinical or restrictive.

We really focus on empowering patients, encouraging them to take part in their own care. The nurses do a fantastic job explaining things in plain, simple language and using leaflets to help patients understand why precautions are needed, or why they might need to go home until they're well. This makes infection prevention something that feels supportive rather than punitive.

Do you find that caring for people in mental health crisis — who may already have other health issues or struggle with daily living — adds extra challenges to infection prevention and overall care?

Shelley: Caring for people in crisis does add a whole new layer of complexity. When someone is experiencing severe depression, they may struggle with basic self-care like showering or changing clothes, which increases infection risks such as UTIs. The team's approach is all about gentle encouragement and respect — using kindness, humour, and trust to motivate patients rather than directive or clinical language. Building strong relationships helps patients feel supported and cared for, not judged.

During COVID outbreaks, this is even more challenging. We have to balance infection prevention with the mental health risks of isolation, knowing that keeping people apart could worsen their condition. Education and collaboration are key — helping patients understand the "why" behind precautions, involving them in decisions, and finding safe ways to bring people back together through masks, hand hygiene, and testing.



Are you often surprised at the things that happen that you've suddenly got to develop a policy for?

Priscilla: Absolutely. things come up all the time that we could never have predicted. With shared dining areas, for example, we've had to think creatively about infection control, introducing disposable wipes instead of alcohol-based hand gels to avoid the risk of ingestion while still keeping everyone safe and hygienic. Then there are the more unexpected challenges, like managing cases of scabies or bed bugs — situations that don't usually crop up in acute care. When someone arrives with their own belongings, the team must think on their feet about how to manage clothing, bedding, and furniture safely, all while keeping the patient's dignity intact. It's a constant balancing act between practicality, safety, and compassion.

What difference has it made having an IPC consultant working within the facility?

Shelley: Having Priscilla here has been a game-changer. We're a small hospital — sometimes there are only three people on a ward or five on a night shift — so flexibility is everything. Priscilla just gets that. She meets people where they're at, whether that means being here at 6:30 in the morning after night shift or standing there with her iPad and a lollipop ready to give flu shots. Since she joined, our vaccination rates have gone up so much because she makes it easy, friendly, and fun — it doesn't feel like another job on the list.

Priscilla: For me, working in IPC in a mental health setting is all about relationships and collaboration. In acute care, you can just hand over a policy and move on, but here, every case is different — every patient has their own needs and care plan. That's where Shelley and I really work well together. We bounce ideas off each other, find practical solutions, and make sure the approach fits our patients and staff. Having that trust, leadership, and support makes all the difference.

I've also become much more holistic since moving into this space. In acute care, it was all about following the policy — 5-7 days for chickenpox, isolate until crusted, that kind of thing. But in mental health, it's not that simple. People are mobile, they're in therapy, they're part of a community. So now it's about assessing each situation — maybe someone can still join group therapy, just sit a bit apart and wear a mask. Most people are vaccinated anyway, so we take a balanced, risk-based approach..

What's your message for Mental Health Month?

Priscilla: For me, Mental Health Month is about reminding IPC professionals that it's okay to be flexible — we're not the "policy police." Infection prevention doesn't have to be black and white. There are always ways to keep everyone safe while still showing compassion and understanding. People living with mental illness deserve the same standard of infection prevention as anyone else — it just needs to be adapted to their needs and delivered with empathy.

Shelley: From my perspective, mental health is no different from any other area of healthcare. The people we support are part of our community — they're our families, our friends, our colleagues. Many are also living with other conditions or receiving treatment in different settings, so they should be treated with the same respect and care as anyone else. Mental Health Month is a good reminder that it only takes the right set of circumstances for any one of us to need that same kind of support.

What is it?

Poliovirus is the virus responsible for polio, an acute illness caused by gastrointestinal infection, that can lead to long-term disability, paralysis and death^{1,2}.

Since the 1980s, the World Health Organization (WHO) has led a global campaign to eradicate polio through mass vaccination programs and case surveillance³. Because of these efforts polio is now considered rare in most parts of the world, though it still circulate in some developing countries³.

The elimination of polio is considered one of the most important public health achievements. In 2000, the WHO declared the Western Pacific region polio free⁴. Today, only a few countries in Asia and Africa still have transmission of poliovirus, but the cases are sporadic and incidence is low². Afghanistan and Pakistan remain two countries where poliovirus continues to circulate².

Every year on the 24th of October, World Polio Day is observed to raise awareness about the importance of polio vaccination, and to celebrate the global efforts that have made eradication of polio achievable⁵.

Signs and Symptoms

Most people infected with poliovirus do not develop symptoms. Around 10% may experience mild symptoms which include fever, headache, tiredness, nausea and vomiting, before making a full recovery³. In rare cases more serious symptoms include stiffness of the back and neck, and paralysis².

The incubation period typically ranges from 3 – 21 days, most commonly around 7-14 days^{2,3}. Cases are considered most infectious from 7-10 days before the onset of symptoms until 7-10 days after symptoms start^{2,3}.

How is it transmitted?

The poliovirus is transmitted through the faecal-oral route, and occasionally the oral-oral route. After entering the mouth, the virus multiplies in the pharynx and gut, and is excreted in faeces for several weeks². Transmission can occur through person-to-person contact with infectious oral secretions or faeces, through drinking water contaminated with untreated sewerage, and when consuming food that has been in contact with contaminated water, or prepared by someone with polio³.

At risk groups?

Children under 5 years of age are mainly affected by poliovirus, but anyone who is not immune can contract and spread polio³.

Unvaccinated people are at increased risk when travelling to countries where polio still circulates, as they may carry the infection with them while travelling to other countries or when returning home³.

Prevention?

Polio is preventable through vaccination, which has dramatically reduced the global incidence³. Children and infants are recommended to be vaccinated, and in Australia this is available through the National Immunisation Program³. Travellers to polio-affected areas, laboratory staff, and healthcare workers who may have contact with poliovirus or polio cases are recommended to receive a booster vaccination every 10 years^{2,3}.

Additional preventive measures include practicing good hygiene when travelling to countries with known polio circulation, including hand hygiene and ensuring food and water are clean and safe to consume³.

Key messages:

- Polio is preventable through vaccination
- Polio still poses a global risk despite being rare
- Awareness and good hygiene are critical for prevention
